Next week will be Planning Week for all staff, and children will participate in their specialist lessons. This day enables staff to prepare, plan and analyse data they have been collecting, and develop the students learning focuses for Term 2.

Preps will continue with Wednesdays off after the long weekend until the end of this term. We look forward to seeing them every day from the start of Term 2. They have made a terrific start to their schooling, and are enjoying the support from their Year 6 buddies to transition into the playground. As parents, we are often concerned for our children. If you are worried they are not coping with school, please contact your child's teacher for an appointment so we can spend time talking with you.

I would also like to remind parents of the code of conduct for parents on the school's website. I am in the unfortunate position of wondering, do we show respect for each other and care for what happens to our staff and children. I refer to the issue of the way staff are spoken to at pick up by parents who refuse to move on to allow others through. Obviously much patience is needed from everyone for the system to work. The system usually does work, but only if people do what they are asked. We are always happy to assist you, and understand your frustrations at times, but we are here to help not hinder and I would ask that you treat staff with the respect they deserve. It is not pleasant to be abused by parents.

Where does this leave us?

I understand this is a small minority of parents and I ask that

- We remain patient and considerate of staff and each other during pick up time
- The signs around the school are observed. Where we ask for Staff only parking I ask you to observe this, unless there has been permission granted and you have a leave in sign giving permission for you to park
- The loading zone is to be free for couriers and emergency situations

A visit from Chisholm Institute of TAFE

On Thursday, Feb 23, 50 students from Chisholm Institute of TAFE, Berwick campus, studying a range of subjects including early childhood development, nature-based education and developing sustainable landscapes visited our school's "Learning Landscape".

The students were divided up into groups and our Year 5A students toured them around our gardens and eco-centre explaining how we designed the garden, what we learn from the gardens, how we maintain and develop them and where their favourite areas are and why.

The students were also given a presentation that described the benefits that interacting with green space provides such as academic, social and emotional, well-being and physical. How we designed, planned and constructed the gardens with our students as collaborators was discussed and explained and images of this process shared.

The feedback from our visitors was, as usual, overwhelmingly positive. They reported that their guides were confident, courteous, knowledgeable, considerate and well spoken. They also saw great pride in and ownership of the gardens and recognised that the students embodied all that was desired from the landscape.

Our students reported that whilst they were nervous to begin with, as they had never been guides before, they quickly realised that they were very capable of undertaking the role and believed they did a good job.

Our Learning Landscapes provide many opportunities throughout the year for our students to develop their leadership skills, embed their understandings of the school ecosystem and extend their speaking and listening skills. I was extremely proud of our year 5A students and look forward to giving our Year 5B an opportunity to tour our next scheduled visitors. The "Learning Landscape" Program enables funds to be generated for developing new areas of the grounds and to subsidise the cost of the STEM program as all visitors pay an excursion fee of \$7 - \$10 head. We are using our Japanese!

Through Monbulk College, we have been put in touch with a primary school in Japan. It is called Sagamigaoka Elementary School, in Zama, Kanagawa Prefecture, which is about 25 miles southwest of Tokyo. http://schit.net/zama/essagamigaoka/index.php?page_id=0

Our Grade 6 students had the opportunity to participate in a Skype session with a 6th Grade class from this school. These are some reflections from our students:

"Today in Japanese we sSkyped Sagamigaoka Elementary School class 6-3. How it worked was we said our hellos and then took turns doing a presentation." Cameron.

"Five groups from each school came up and showed us a game or something about their country. There was singing, bingo, introductions and piano playing... they showed us their biggest mountain. My favourite was bingo." Sam.

"Tameem and I talked with them in Japanese about how we are learning to do our self-introductions. As I talked, I had so many nerves, but as I talked, I got all of my nerves out." Tim.

"Different people from our grade talked about different things, and people from their school talked as well. Those students will be graduating in (March) because the Japanese school year goes from April through to March." Josh.

"Me and Liam talked about footy. None of them knew what it was!" Jonah.

"I was very nervous and tried to talk slowly. They spoke amazing English. Japanese has kinda become scary because I am talking to real Japanese people. They were a lot more polite than us" Liam.

"Lilium and I asked questions in Australian. I asked if they liked school and music.... I noticed that they use black boards (and) they have their own desks" Pearl.

"Me and my friend got up and spoke about cricket. We showed them a cricket ball and a cricket bat as well. Some things that were different was they had the same shoes and they were a lot more respectful than us" Noah W.

"Tameem, Honey and I went and sang a song for them... The differences were that they had their own desks to themselves..." Charlie, 6A

"I noticed that they did not wear a school uniform.... I thought it was fun and am excited for when we do it again" Natasha.

"I can't wait to meet (their) new grade 6s next month!" Anton.

"The first thing they showed us was how to play rock, paper, scissors, then they showed us how to juggle. That was cool. They also showed us bingo, kendama, and they sang for us. They also did a presentation on Mount Fuji." Honey.

"I really liked it because we put our 6 years of Japanese learning to good use. It was great fun!" Isaac.

"I enjoyed it and most other people did as well!" Nick, 6A.

Preparing for the Risk of Bushfire

I'm sure you are all very aware of the increased risk of bushfire we face by living in such a beautiful, forested environment. Whilst there will always be a risk here, there are many things we can do to make us as safe as possible.

At school, our Emergency Management Plan provides a detailed procedure to deal with fire in our immediate area and we also have processes that ensure we are ready to respond on days when the fire danger is significant.

On days of Total Fire Ban, we:

- Limit the area students can play in the school grounds to enable us to gather them quickly if necessary
- Prepare the Hall, roll down the metal shutters
- Ask students to keep shoes on inside in case we need to re-locate
- Use a 'book mark' system when students leave the classroom and they must go in pairs
- Monitor the VicEmergency website and CFA radio traffic
- Ensure all students are collected by an adult after school (unless written parental consent is provided)

In the event of bushfire in the immediate area, we want to reassure you that your children will be cared for and kept as safe as possible and, although it will be difficult, we ask that you resist driving straight to school to collect your child. In emergency conditions, you are likely to be anxious and possibly panicked, which can increase your own risk of having an accident on the way to school. This will only add to the distress on the day. Secondly, if the air is smokey, opening the Hall's roller shutters for you to enter will compromise the air quality inside and make conditions even more uncomfortable for students and staff.

We will keep you informed as the situation unfolds and advise you as soon as it is safe to come to school and pick up your children. Please be sure to check in with your child's teacher and sign your child out before taking them as it is vital that we know that every student has been released into the care of an adult.

Emergencies such as bushfire are made more difficult by being unprepared. Staff at The Patch School spend a great deal of time preparing for fire and other situations so please know that our students' safety is paramount and we will do all we can to preserve that, regardless of what comes our way.

Note that Deb has mentioned in this newsletter that the Department of Education & Training has recently announced that schools on the *Bushfire At Risk Register* in the 'upper cohort' will close on days of Extreme fire danger as well as Code Red days. This includes The Patch School.

It is also important for *your* family to have a bushfire survival plan and that you:

- Understand and practice your plan
- Know what the trigger is to enact your plan
- Let your extended family and friends know what you plan to do

If your plan involves leaving the area on days of significant fire danger, remember that absence from school under these circumstances is acceptable and approved by the Principal.

If you have any questions about how we manage bushfire risk or any other emergency, please don't hesitate to contact the school.


