FROM THE PRINCIPAL...

Thought for the week: Strength lies in differences not in similarities - Stephen Covey

In the last two weeks we have acknowledged differences in our community, last week we recognised children and people with Epilepsy and this week we have acknowledged children with Autism Spectrum Disorder.

Six years ago I was sent a great article from a parent please take the time to read "Have you been to Holland" by Emily Perl Kinglsey

I am often asked to describe the experience of raising a child with a disability - to try to help people who have not shared that unique experience to understand it, to imagine how it would feel. It's like this......

When you're going to have a baby, it's like planning a fabulous vacation trip - to Italy. You buy a bunch of guide books and make your wonderful plans. The Coliseum, The Michelangelo David, The gondolas in Venice. You may learn some handy phrases in Italian. It's all very exciting.

After months of eager anticipation, the day finally arrives. You pack your bags and off you go. Several hours later, the plane lands. The stewardess comes in and says, "Welcome to Holland." "Holland?!?" you say. "What do you mean Holland?? I signed up for Italy! I'm supposed to be in Italy. All my life I've dreamed of going to Italy."

But there's been a change in the flight plan. They've landed in Holland and there you must stay. The important thing is that they haven't taken you to a horrible, disgusting, filthy place, full of pestilence, famine and disease. It's just a different place.

So you must go out and buy new guide books. And you must learn a whole new language. And you will meet a whole new group of people you would never have met.

It's just a different place. It's slower-paced than Italy, less flashy than Italy. But after you've been there for a while and you catch your breath, you look around.... and you begin to notice that Holland has windmills....and Holland has tulips. Holland even has Rembrandts.

But everyone you know is busy coming and going from Italy... and they're all bragging about what a wonderful time they had there. And for the rest of your life, you will say "Yes, that's where I was supposed to go. That's what I had planned."

And the pain of that will never, ever, ever, ever go away... because the loss of that dream is a very, very significant loss.

But... if you spend your life mourning the fact that you didn't get to Italy, you may never be free to enjoy the very special, the very lovely things ... about Holland.

I hope you have enjoyed this piece it rings true with so many things in life. We are often expecting things to be as we have planned but strangely life throws us many challenges to deal with. I have always believed we are only sent what we can deal with, however sometimes we need a helping hand as life can overwhelm us. Our Preps are now attending school full time. It is amazing how much they have grown over the past 10 weeks, they are now truly part of the The Patch family. They are still learning the routines and boundaries but it is wonderful to see how engrossed they are in their learning activities and how enthusiastically they approach their work.

CYBER SAFETY

The upcoming holiday period often means more "spare" time to surf the internet and spend time within virtual environments. With this extra usage, whilst knowing some parents will still need to attend to work commitments and other duties, it is most important to **monitor your child's computer usage at all times**, but especially over weekends and when holiday periods arrive.

We can't ignore the fact that our children need to be taught boundaries in regards to social media. All parents need to take responsibility to ensure that their children are safe online and haven't signed up to apps they are underage for. Please be the parent and the hard call on what your children can have access to. A good example is we don't give L palates to children and then allow them to be a driver by themselves, we allow them to learn with us, guiding by the side. Let this be the same with social media be a learner with your child. Keep them safe and know what they are doing.

What does it mean to be safe online?

Behaving safely online means:

- protecting one's own privacy and personal information.
- protecting the privacy of others (this can be sharing personal information or images, which in most cases is unlawful).
- selecting appropriate spaces to work. The home computer should be set up in the kitchen area or somewhere common. Not laptops tucked away in bedrooms.
- being proactive in letting someone know if there is something that is "not quite right". At home this would be a parent or guardian, at school a teacher.
- Ensuring a suitable "net nanny" has been activated on your computer.

Of course, these principles of safety and responsibility are not specific to the web, applying to the use of the internet both at home and at school. The virtual world of the internet involves many risks. Schools utilise and discuss positive strategies that help to minimise these risks. However, parents also have a key role to play in keeping children safe whilst online. For example, "Face Book" accounts should only be made available to children above the age of 13. Please try hard to resist the "nagging" and the old saying" but EVERYONE else has an account." This of course is not true!

RESPONDING TO CHILDREN REGARDING EVENTS IN CHRISTCHURCH:

The Education Department has sent the following information to be shared with our communities:

Tips for supporting children and young people:

Common reactions:

- It is common to think about safety and predictability of the world when tragedies such as the Christchurch incident occur. Reactions are influenced by many factors:
- Knowing someone impacted.
- Identifying with the victims and survivors.
- Seeing and hearing terrifying images and discussions.

The developmental age of the person influences what they understand and how they respond. Some may be unaware, others will be following all the discussions and media coverage, looking for understanding.

What to say and how to care:

Here are some ways you can make children and young people feel safe:

- Give reassurance that the incident is over.
- Keep to routines, as they are reassuring.
- Have time to listen and talk. Listen to concerns and worries and discuss strategies for feeling safe, dealing with worry and being able to take action. This helps in repairing safety and calm.
- Give a calm response to their concerns.
- Keep your explanations appropriate for their age and development. Start at their starting point: ask what the child/young person understands about what has happened and what their key worry is. Each child will have a different understanding and will find different parts of what has happened frightening or worrying. Very young children need simple, factual information balanced with assurances of safety. Older children will be appraising their own, and loved ones, safety. They may need help with separating reality form fantasy, and to dispel rumours.
- Reduce exposure to media coverage and conversations that are distressing and not age-appropriate.
- Monitor their emotional state. Changes in behaviour, appetite and sleep can be an indicator of anxiety or worry. Young children often express worry through bodily aches and pains

Put The Patch on The Tracks!

Have you heard about our submission to VicTrack last year where we applied for one of the 134 historic retired Melbourne trams?

Well, despite huge competition (over 1,500 applications received), The Patch Primary has been selected as one of 16 schools and allocated tram number 986, a W Class tram, responsible for transporting millions of Victorians and an integral part of our rich heritage. VicTrack will gift the tram and cover the transport costs from Newport, where it is currently residing, to its location at The Patch.

Last Wednesday, Eloise Hayler, who is part of the tram submission team, and I, visited the Newport Newport Tram Depot to inspect our tram and meet with the School Building Authority representatives to discuss any restoration works. Our tram is in good condition and would be a wonderful extension to our outdoor classroom and landscape for many reasons:

- provide a historical context and an opportunity to learn and embed safe public transport use (especially for our year 5/6 students during city camp)
- introduce students to social and economic enterprise through using the space as a cafe/pop up marketplace, during our many community events
- create an environment that will foster imaginative play and social interaction
- offer shelter during wet weather and respite from the Sun.
- provide a focal point and a meeting place for families and community members and a venue for community events
- provide an early learning opportunity for the School's on-site kindergarten
- act as a launch pad for a community projects and collaboration with students
- be accessible beyond school hours to help foster a community hub
- offer additional learning spaces that are interesting, inspiring and stimulating

Our next step is to await further information and timelines and to identify any requirements the school may need to provide. For further information, see Eloise or Michelle.

STUDENT SAFETY – BUSHFIRE EMERGENCY PROCEDURES @ PATCH PS

IMPORTANT INFORMATION ABOUT DAYS OF EXTREME & CODE RED FIRE DANGER

In the interest of the safety of our students, families and staff, The Patch School will:

- Be closed on days where the Fire Danger Rating is Extreme and will relocate to Knox Central Primary School, Boronia.
- Be closed on days when the Fire Danger Rating is Code Red, as per DET policy

As our school is on DET's Bushfire At-Risk Register, The Patch School WILL BE CLOSED on Code Red days

Where possible, when a Code Red day is declared, you will be notified between 4-6 days beforehand BUT it may be as little as 3 days. Once confirmed (no later than 1pm the day before the anticipated closure), regardless of any late change in the expected weather, the school will be closed and this will not change.

Due to the elevated bushfire risk, **there will be no staff at school on these days.** Updates on <u>school</u> <u>closures</u> and information on Code Red days can be found on the DET Emergency Management web page.

On days of Extreme Fire Danger, The Patch School WILL BE CLOSED and RELOCATE to Knox Central Primary School – NO OSHC PROGRAM WILL BE AVAILABLE AT KNOX CENTRAL PS

On days of Extreme Fire Danger there will again be no staff at school. If this occurs, families will be notified using SMS and email (no later than 1pm the day before the anticipated closure) so please be aware you may receive the same information more than once. We will also require a 'read receipt' from you to be absolutely sure everyone is aware of this situation.

Information about the current and expected Fire Danger Ratings can be found in weather forecasts on daily news programs, published on websites and in newspapers, broadcast on radio and on the $\underline{\mathsf{CFA}}$ website .

Please note that it is the responsibility of every family to:

- 1. know where to find and understand Fire Danger Rating information
- 2. understand The Patch School's procedure for days of EXTREME fire danger and CODE RED fire danger
- 3. sign the form acknowledging your acceptance of these responsibilities and return it to the school (The Patch Permission form that should be completed upon enrolment).

Please note the following procedure for children who are relocating:

- Your child will be expected to attend Knox Central PS
- Students are to arrive at Knox Central PS by 9am, no earlier than 8:45am. No staff will be on duty.
- All Parents are to park and sign their children in at the office/designated area for The Patch PS students. Please do not just drop your child off.
- All students must be collected at 3:30pm from the designated area and signed out by their parent/guardian/emergency contact. Please note that there is no afterschool care.

Thank you for your support and co-operation with this important safety matter.

SUPERVISION

The playground is supervised from 8.45am and children should not be at school before this time unless prearranged by a teacher or due to a school event. Each day teachers will be in their classroom at 8.55am and parents should note that lessons begin at 9am sharp. If you need to speak with your class teacher around more complex issues, please arrange an alternative mutually agreeable time after school.

If your child is ill at school, or suffers an accident, then staff will give immediate care and appropriate first aid. However, on occasions, it is necessary to contact parents and we are often frustrated by out of date information that delays this process.

Please make sure you notify the school Office of any changes to your contact details or those of your Emergency Contacts as well as mobile phone numbers for our SMS system. Obviously, in extreme cases we may also deem it necessary to call an ambulance before consulting parents and you need to be aware of this. Please also keep the Office informed of any change in medical issues faced by your children as this helps us to make the best choices for their welfare. Your up to date contact information is especially important for our SMS system in case we need to contact you in case of an emergency e.g. bushfire.




